She took a variety of good fabrics to Nora Shapiro's for a day of dyeing then had the best results with a silk-like cotton sheet from GoodWill that was used to apply the mordant. She gave an excellent explanation of the process with bits of information added by Michelle and Rachel. Alchemy. She said it felt like Christmas morning.

**Sue Scott** had two pieces juried into the show Strength Struggle Survival - Military Veterans and First Nations peoples share common stories of survival at Olympic College's Art Gallery in Bremerton. The show opens with refreshments Friday April 13 at 5:00.

**Linda Carlson** modeled the completed jacket she created using a modified 1970 Vogue pattern. She added beads and enlarged the corsage since the last meeting.

**Pat Herkal** passed around a beaded collar she made for Sue as a thank you for the gift of Sue's mother's bead collection. The off center piece was made using a large clay cabochon, a variety of beads and antique jade 'daggers'.

**Donna Lark** modeled a felted hat/mask inspired by Franz Marc's Animals in the Landscape painting. She is making it for the PT Wearable Art Show. The whimsical creation has large ears, very large antlers and curly wool locks on the forehead. She plans to felt is smaller and add horns, eyes and nostrils. Her son will model it with a large coat she is making. Her daughter will model a felted wedding dress and has requested a hat/mask for her outfit.

Janice Speck brought one of her felted beaded creations with animal themed beads. She donated it to Jean-Marie for the fundraiser.Donna Lee has been inspired by the metamorphosis theme and is elaborately sewing butterflies and plants. She shared a detailed piece

with flora, butterflies and a background using 30-40 different green fabrics.

She reported on the new Kitsap SDA chapter. They meet the same day we do from 7:00-8:30 at Barn on Bainbridge Island. The focus of their meetings is projects. Emily Brown is looking for teachers at Barn. Donna Lark will be teaching an introduction to nuno felting class there. **Rachel Gaspers** was stitching on an apron made from an old white shirt in preparation for an online India Flint ecodyeing workshop. She suggested using soy milk without any additives for a premodant when dyeing cotton.

**Caryl Fallert-Gentry** received the award for the Best Use of Color at the AQS annual show. Her quilt Pi in the Rye was juried into the Schack show the Intersection of Art + Math opening April 26.

**Kindy Kemp and Joyce Wilkerson** shared a preview of their installation for the May-July Fiber Habit window - Chaos and String Theory, the process of creating fiber art. They each sewed together a long 'string' of samples of their works that they strung around our meeting space. They will both also have finished pieces to include in the window.

Pat met Pamela last fall in Peru when they participated in the Andean Textile Arts pre Tinkuy tour. Pamela lived in Tokyo from 1961-65. She has been active in the fiber arts since she was a young girl. She returned to Japan in 2015 for her high school reunion and a fiber tour with Yoshiko Iwamoto Wada. Pamela had a powerpoint presentation on Beni Itajime - a Japanese fugitive red dye and clamp resist method. Beni dye is made from dried safflower petals and is not color fast. Photos of the pieces she shared were made before 1932. She will send further information, sources and book suggestions to me and I will send it out in an email(s).
