What's For Lunch

Our major exhibit for 2023 will be March 24-May 23 at the Port Angeles Fine Arts Center. "What's For Lunch," with food as the theme, will highlight the work of the late Gene White, an advocate of child nutrition programs, show projects made with remnants of her mink coat, and display our own food-focused pieces, reminded Evette. When asked how many expected to participate, most hands went up.

Show and Tell

Cynthia LeRouge showed a piece made in a class conducted by David Owen Hastings (davidowenhastings.com/contact/), which she enthusiastically recommended, and explained how she is trying a new (to her, anyway) material available at Encaustiflex.com. She has not seamed it, but another member said it is easy to sew with.

Barbara is doing a series of three women's heads, and she showed one, which featured kimono fabric for hair and futon batting as stuffing.

Eva showed a piece of ocean jasper she has carved as a gift for her son.

Pat added that the bracelet she was wearing featured jasper. She also announced two calls to artists, one at Vashon Center for the Arts, gallery.vashoncenterforthearts.org, and one at Bainbridge Island. The deadline for the Bainbridge Island Museum of Art group exhibition is Saturday, Oct. 15. See biartmuseum.org and callforentry.org.

Diane Campo, a first-timer, showed a full-face mask she had made.

Terri showed an art quilt inspired by her work as an oncology nurse that featured text she had stenciled on with acrylics and words appliqued. She told us she buys any fabric she sees with words for her stash.

Tracy showed one of her first beading projects.

Carol displayed more of her recent weaving projects, including a colorful bag made from leftover yarns gathered at a retreat.

Deb announced she has a piece accepted for a Norfolk VA gallery and noted that the cost of preparing the piece, especially the shipping, was a surprise. The gallery is D'Art Center, the show is "Dynamic II," and her piece is titled "Camouflaged".

Donna passed around the Legion of Honor (San Francisco) museum flyer on the Guo Pei exhibit that she just toured and reminded that her solo show in Bainbridge Island was open for a few more days.

Mary shared that she was speaking online for SAQA's Oct. 13 meeting regarding her fractal designs. No word on whether the presentation was taped.

Marilyn showed her initial eco-printing projects using wool, silk, cotton and paper.

Janice recommended the book "Threads of Life" and suggested we have a member-to-member sale of art and related items at an upcoming meeting, ideally in time for holiday gifting. She also showed more of her multi-color necklaces and said yes, she does make her own felt beads.
