Carol Olson shared a few quilts using her hand dyed fabrics - some mixed with commercial fabric. Others were made in an attempt to use up her stash of many colorful scraps she has accumulated over the years. They were quilted with her new long arm.

Pat Herkal modeled the couture tunic made for her by Barbara Ramsey using Barbara's lovely ecodyed cotton fabric. It was a trade for a beaded necklace. She also showed her mobile, Sacred Journey, 3 salmon - chinook, coho and sockeye - made of silk kimono scrap bits - pieced, embroidered and beaded along with fabric kelp hanging from beach found kelp.

Cheri Kopp modeled her caplet Orange you a Cutie from the PT Wearable Art show. It is made of many different Cutie labels with a magnetic closure.

Sue Gale continued the clothing theme with her hand dyed, painted and free motion quilted vest. It has an asymmetrical large button closure. She is looking forward to dyeing rayon at a class in Coupeville.

Annie Karl has a thrift store addiction. She refused to share her source making everyone jealous with her tunic, needle punch pillow and embellished jackets purchased ????

Debra Olson brought a large amount of Dresden quilt blocks pieced by her mother. She shared them with eager recipients. She brought 2 of her unfinished fabric collages because people are often curious about her process. She starts with canvas that she paints, stitches, cuts apart and embellishes then rearranges and mounts then adds more embellishment.

Kindy Kemp showed a bag she made using her dyed fabrics.

Donna Lee Dowdney is participating in the Kingston Art Festival. She has 7 mixed media pieces hanging at the Jefferson County Hospital in PT. She also won a cash award at the PETA show in Poulsbo. Caryl Breyer Gentry is collaborating with her husband, Ron, embellishing one of his large photographs they had printed on cloth.

Erica Iseminger shared a shibori table runner dyed with fermented persimmon juice dye and iron water. Her exquisite pattern was made by 'a bit of folding'.

Barbara Ramsey finished a small wall hanging mixing her ecodyed fabric with commercial fabric. David Moore's black and white quilt with one red broken heart - the Fractures Quilt - was inspired by the results of the 2016 election. Machine pieced, hand appliquéd and quilted, it represents the different fractures in our society.

Janice Speck modeled a tie-dyed tunic she purchased at the Oregon Country Fair. It drapes nicely, is comfortable and has held up over years of wear. Dharma sells blanks of this inexpensive tunic. Rosemary Burris shared a detailed and realistic appliqué quilt of koi and a flower. She is interesting in exploring ways of working with resin. Suggestions appreciated.
